

Some Data Relating to Architectural Dating of Features of the Moore and "Collier" Houses.

- Dormer window design and roof line.

- Closest on both counts is Seawells' Tavern or Ordinary in Gloucester County, dated 1754 in commercial literature. This is a frame bldg.
- Very similar, except that roof break is just above dormer roof peaks, is the Parker House, Onancock, Accomack County, dated c.1762 by Whitelaw. This was a frame house with brick ends.
- The following are all very similar to each other, and differ from "our" houses by having a flat sloping roof over the dormer windows, which is virtually an extension of the upper roof with the same slope:
 - Rural Happiness/Mozambique near Locustville, Accomack County, dated c. 1789 by Whitelaw.
 - West House n.w. of Onancock, Accomack County, dated c. 1725 by Whitelaw.
 - Old Curtis House n. of Onancock, Accomack County, dated c. 1700-1721 by Whitelaw, perhaps earlier.
 - Bloxom House near Bloxom, Accomack County, dated 1786 by Whitelaw.
 - Conquest House between Hallwood and Temperanceville, Accomack County, date c. 1725-1750 by Whitelaw. This is a "half-house" similar to the old part of the Collier house.
 - Wallop House n.e. of Wattsville, Accomack County, dated c. 1718-1738 by Whitelaw.
 - Westover in Charles City County, dated 1726-30, has a wing (south) with this same characteristics.
- Very similar is the "Moore House" in Yorktown, dated ~~1700~~ 1700-1739 by the NPS, and c. 1768 in earlier accounts.
